


Brand new back-to-school book!

New Newsletter News - Early Childhood Corner



Our state is working hard to strengthen literacy instruction for all students, including children that aren't enrolled just yet! Since 2017, the RISE Initiative has focused on ensuring that all teachers understand the science of reading and how our brains learn to read, but did you know that Arkansas also has a PreK RISE Initiative? The goal of the Pre-K RISE Initiative is not to have students read before they enter Kindergarten but to lay down the essential groundwork needed to ensure students succeed when reading instruction starts. Each month, the RISE Newsletter will shine a spotlight on what parents of preschoolers can do to ensure students have a strong start in foundational literacy! If you don't have preschool students at home, we would love for you to forward this information to someone that does have little ones preparing for school.

New books every month!

Storytime is essential for brain development for children of all ages. Even before they can talk, children need to hear language to support brain development. Reading and telling stories with children is a great way to expose them to a rich variety of words.

Each month, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library mails a high-quality, age-appropriate book to all registered children, addressed to them, at no cost to the child's family.
