What are writing mechanics?

Agreed-upon rules of writing used to make writing clear and comprehensible.

Below are the end-of-the-year expectations to work towards in each grade. Encourage your students to use correct punctuation in all their writing.



Pre-writing in preschool

The Arkansas CDELS (Child Development and Early Learning Standards), is a set of shared expectations for what children typically know, understand, and are

able to do at different ages of early childhood. Below are a few emergent writing skills to consider if you have preschoolers at home.

From 9-36 months, children should:

 Explore writing tools and movements, making scribble marks with increasing control.

How can parents help? Let children write with differentsized writing tools every day. Let them scribble, draw copy, trace, and have fun with a variety of writing materials!

From 19-60 months, children should:

 Show increasing understanding that writing carries a message and uses scribbles, letter-like shapes, or letters to represent words or ideas

How can parents help? When your child draws a picture, ask them to tell you about their picture

and write what they say.

Write your name!

Not sure what your little one should be writing? Have them practice writing their name!

It is, of course, their favorite word! Provide lots of different materials and different kinds of writing tools to keep engagement and excitement high!

One important thing to remember from the very beginning is to encourage your child to capitalize *only* the first letter in their name. Most children learn to write capital letters first because they are easier to write. However, when children begin writing their names in all capital letters, it is a very hard habit to break. Place lots of correct examples all around for them to use as models to encourage correct name-writing practice from the very beginning!

Copy Cat

Did you know that children as young as 2-years-old begin to imitate the act of writing by creating drawings and symbolic markings that represent their thoughts and ideas? Promote daily writing practice in fun ways! A little bit of shaving cream can be a novel way to practice writing. Give your preschooler a dollop on a tray. Have them spread it out with their fingers, and write until their heart is content!

BATH TIME FUN Writing letters and numbers is always more fun in the bathtub! Pick up a pack of tub crayons and let your little one practice their prewriting skills and strengthen their fine motor skills. Fun and learning go hand in hand!
